



## Where London leavers move to

A mixture of affordability, lifestyle and flexible working have combined to make moving out of London an attractive proposition for people leaving the capital to set up home. Whether renting or buying, our analysis shows that the majority of London leavers move to areas just outside Greater London.

Thurrock in Kent tops the list with 66% of incomers last year moving from London and where they spent an average of £261,530 on their home. But increasingly London leavers are moving further afield with places such as Southend-on-Sea in Essex, Chiltern (which takes in Buckinghamshire) and Canterbury in Kent creeping into the top 30 areas that Londoners move to.

The analysis shows which boroughs in the capital people have moved from and demonstrates the way in which London leavers generally move along linear lines extending outwards from where they currently live. Broadly speaking this means people in East London tend to move out to Eastern regions while those in the South West of the capital are more likely to move further West. But affordability barriers mean people are moving even further, to purchase the biggest home that they can afford, so that they don't have to keep moving and paying transactions costs.

Of the largest cities around the country, Oxford and Cambridge attract the largest proportion of London buyers (22%) given their close links with the capital. But places such as Leicester (20%), Portsmouth (18%) and Bournemouth (16%) where house prices and rents are more affordable than London, come close behind. One of the greatest drivers for London leavers with families is the opportunity to buy more property for their money, while for first-time buyers, a move out of London provides the chance to get onto the initial rung of the property ladder.
